- Lot 7 Out
- Lot 18 Late Addition- Flintlock musketoen or carbine in British style for colonial forces. Shows Arabic or Persian cartouche on lock. .69 caliber with brass mounts and captured ramrod. Saddle ring bar on left, fair to good condition. Mid 19th century. Est: \$500 - \$1,000
- Lot 51 One matching original magazine and 1 extra X marked extra original spare mag.
- Lot 279 Correct Description-Original oil painting on canvas of George Armstrong Custer in fringe buckskin scout shirt with eagle buttons and wearing Stetson, signed Juan Menchala, dated 1969. Measuring approx. 24"(h) by 20"(w) nicely framed and in fine condition. Provenance Butterfield and Butterfield, 1990's. Est: \$1,000 - \$3,000.
- Lot 473 Late Addition- Sharps model 1859, .52 caliber military rifle with 30" barrel, iron patchbox, serial #38517. The rifle is in near relic condition with heavy rust and patina. Lock and serial #'s visible. Stock rough but sound. Some light to heavy pitting overall. Rear sight leaves missing, base intact. Will cock, but action won't open. An out of the attic estate piece that may research well through available serial number lists. \$700 - \$1,400
- Lot 504 Late Addition-Important documentary and pictorial record of the Rochester Ordinance District, compiled by District Chief, Colonel Frank J. Atwood including an oversized 14"x 12" notebook with approx. 85 original WW II period photos of Colonel Atwood with various military and civilian dignitaries involved in the war effort and many photos showing famous weapons manufactured for the services including the M2 .50 caliber Browning Machine Gun; the M-7 tank built by the American Locomotive Company for use in North Africa; National Postal Meter Co. photos of M-1 carbine production; ceremony of Savage Arms Company's production of the one millionth sub-machine gun production (including photo of production line with rows of Savage sub-machine guns; photos of an Ordinance display of tanks and weaponry at the Washington Park in Rochester, New York; photos of the final 155 mm M2 gun and carriage produced at the American Locomotive Co. plant and acceptance of the one millionth Springfield Model 1903-A3 at Remington Arms Co. Also included is a copy of two exploded views of the Colt Model M .32 and .380 semi-auto pistol in old shipping tube and a wood display block with brass plaque stating "300,000th .45 cal. Automatic pistol produced by the Ithaca Gun Company presented to Col. F.J. Atwood Chief of the Rochester Ordinance District May 19, 1945" (pistol not included). A historic collection of WW II documents, photos and mementos that belongs in a military museum of serious collector's inventory. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.
- Lot 505 Late Addition- American Revolutionary War musket made from model 1763 Charleyville with American made New England style stock. Sheet brass ramrod pipes and hand-forged crude ramrod. Buttplate modified from Brown Bess. Original flintlock with resurfaced frizen. Heavy, almost black patina. Repairs and losses to stock. Out of attic condition. Letter of appraisal from noted antique dealer included. Bored or shot out to almost .80 caliber, smooth. Just the type our Revolutionary forces assembled from parts on hand and carried home and used as a fowler. Est: \$3,000 - \$6,000
- Lot 513 Late Addition- Beautifully etched, gold washed and niter blued presentation sword circa early 19th century; approx. 37-1/2" overall with an approx. 31-1/2" blade, brass cross guard and pommel with ivory grip. The blade has an etched panel with the inscription "His Excellency Caleb Strong". This sword is in overall very good to excellent condition with approx. 90% of its original niter blue and approx. 95% of its original gold wash in patriotic etchings on both sides of the blade. The ivory grip shows mellow toning and several slight age cracks. Caleb Strong was the sixth and tenth governor of Massachusetts. He was a delegate to the Constitutional Congress that drafted our Constitution but was not a signor. He was born January 9, 1745, and died November 7, 1819. He had a long career in State politics

and was involved with the Mass. Militia. He may have carried or used this unusual sword in a State function. An outstanding blade (no scabbard) that should be further researched. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.

- Lot 514 Late Addition- European carved ivory handled trousse or knife and fork set circa 1600's-1700's, both approx. 9" overall with two prong fork and rounded blade knife with two star hallmark; the carved ivory handles show two different erotic poses of a man and woman; the knife's handle shows a mellow patina with a small age crack that extends from the hilt upward approx. halfway up the grip; the fork ivory handle also has a pleasing patina and also shows a slight age crack from the hilt upward approx. 1" in a "V" formation. A well-accomplished early carved set, possibly Mastrich, Holland where this type ivory carving was popular in the 17th and 18th centuries. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.
- Lot 515 Late Addition- Smith & Wesson #2 Army, .32 caliber rimfire, blue finish, ivory grips, in original W. Kidder case. Serial # 7354. The pistol remains in original fine condition with 92-96% original bright commercial blue finish with beautifully aged period ivory grips, also near fine condition just showing slight yellowing and minor "checking" on the bottoms. The hammer shows 50% dulling case colors. The pistol is contained within a near fine original "W. Kidder" marked case with 1854 patent date. The case shows original brownish colored velveteen with two compartment covers retained, original bone-ivory pulls and proper cleaning rod. The outside of the case is very good plus to near fine and shows brass corners and fittings. A fine Smith & Wesson in a rare original casing. From a major New England collection that arrived late. Est: \$7,000 - \$14,000
- Lot 516 Late Addition- Colt Single Action Army Revolver, .45 caliber 5-1/2" barrel, nickel finish, wood grips, serial #109248 with "L. Gallatin & Co Cheyenne Wyoming Territory" marked holster. The Colt shows approx. 95-98% old renicked finish and barrel shortened from 7-1/2" to 5-1/2". The markings and patent dates are legible and fairly sharp. The grips are refinished nicely. The interior is good. The nickel is old and probably 19th century and shows some creeping rust, erosion, and slight pinprick pitting in those areas where the nickel has lifted. The holster shows repairs and rebacking with good marking. An interesting 1880's period rig which has been together all its life as the holster is for a 7-1/2" barrel (This Colt's original length). From a local estate, this single action has never been lettered from the factory. Est: \$3,000 - \$6,000
- Lot 517 Late Addition- Framed original color oil painting by noted Western artist Russ Vickers entitled "Run for the Backfire" showing two mounted riders and a chuck wagon racing ahead of a prairie fire to reach the protection of the back fire. Image size is approx. 23" x 35". The scene is extremely well-executed showing great action in the running horses, detailed cowboys and real life fire. This painting would display beautifully in any Western theme room or office. Priced in Scottsdale, Arizona Galleries in this size above \$12,000. Est.: \$4,000-\$8,000.
- Lot 526 Late Addition-Unique fowling piece/Cane Gun of French origin stamped "A I Peffin". This oddity features a beautifully made fowling piece of approx. 20 ga. percussion measuring 35" overall with 22" bbl. in stock. The bbl removes from patent breech and doubles as a shaft for cane. the cane handle is carved horn with a decorated steel overlay of dog. The stock is finely carved with portrait of bearded man at pistol grip with beautiful checkering at wrist. Near fine condition with 90% brown on bbl, bright finish steel mounts, fine to excellent stock. Unusual trigger safety. A 1 of a kind Cane-Gun and Oddity Fowler. Est. \$6,000-12,000
- Lot 527 Late Addition-Large frame Dumantier SxS percussion knife Pistol with seldom found original leather sheath, 9mm cal., 3 1/2" barrels, 9" blade between the two barrels with the right side of the blade stamped "Dumantier Fila Garantified" and "Government", iron construction, fluted horn grip, approx. 13 1/2" overall with leather sheath mounted with an iron throat & tip. This oddity knife pistol is in overall very good to excellent condition showing a bright finish to the blade & barrels with scattered light points of erosion and pin prick pitting, sharp markings, crisp action that includes a single folding trigger that releases the hammers one at a time. Iron cross guard, very good fluted horn grip. The center blade is of spear point configuration and grooved on both sides to permit firing of the barrels. The sheath is in overall

very good condition showing slight stitching separation at the throat & a couple small losses but otherwise complete. A very rare oddity combination knife pistol in the seldom found large frame variation with unique markings. Est. \$5,000-8,000

- Lot 528 Late Addition-Cased engraved and Gold washed large frame brass DA Pinfire Revolver, 11mm cal., 6 1/4" round barrel, raised carved Ebony grips, #10178. This gun is in overall excellent condition showing relief vine & flower engraving on the frame, cylinder, barrel and trigger guard, Belgian proofs, approx. 60% Gold wash over brass remaining, steel hammer & trigger, lanyard ring in butt, swing down loading gate, excellent raised carved Ebony grips in vine and flower motif that matches the engraving on the gun. Crisp action, good bore, ejector rod retained. The leather covered wood case is in very good condition measuring approx. 14" x 6" x 3" with brass presentation plaque on lid marked "P. Bastien" and trimmed in brass tacks, the interior shows its original red material lining with two compartments with lids and shows only slight wear from the recoil shield, a functioning key is also present. A seldomly found variation of a large frame pinfire revolver with an inscription on the lid that may be researchable. Est. \$5,000-8,000
- Lot 530 Late Addition-Original oil painting on canvas showing rampaging Indian braves signed Don Prechtel dated 1968, approximately 20" high by 24" wide, nicely framed and matted. Needs some slight cleaning and minor conservation. Don Prechtel is one of the Northwest's most recognized artists who is well known for his Civil War scenes and western depictions and is recognized throughout the United States. His work is housed in many prominent collections and museums. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.
- Lot 536 Interesting set of double barrel 410 gauge exposed hammer shotguns by Watson and Jeffrey. The guns are contained within a period luggage type case with "Watson Bros. Old Bond St., London" dealers trade label in lid showing Watson's appointment to "The Sultan of Turkey". Gun #1: Marked Watson Bros. on locks and barrels and engraved sleeved by J. Roberts and Son, London. Shows 3-1/4" and later British proofs for smokeless powder originally black powder proofed for 2-1/2" shells. The gun measures 44 1/4" overall with 27-7/8" barrels, weighs only 4 pounds, 10 ounces and measures 14" to end of wood from front trigger and nearly 15" to end of hard rubber pad with two spacers. The barrels show approx. 90% toning old English re-finish with slight losses. Locks and frame have drifted to grey-brown. Stock has been professionally re-freshed. Locks up tight and bores are bright. Shows just minor use since professional restoration possibly by J. Roberts when modernized, serial #1751. Gun #2: Marked S. R. Jeffrey on both locks and S.R. Jeffrey, Guildford on barrel. Barrels measure 26" and gun 42-1/2" overall; 14-1/4" from front trigger to end of wood and 14-7/8" to end of checkered horn butt plate which extends the pull approx. one half inch. The gun shows black powder proofs and chambers have been lengthened but not re-proofed. The gun weighs approx. 4 pounds, 11 ounces. The barrels show approx. 90%-95% toning English restored blue finish, locks have gone to a silvery gray and stocks professionally re-freshed. The actions are crisp, locks up tight and bores bright, serial #5476. The pair are contained within an original to the period leather covered luggage type case. The interior is lined in red baize or felt and shows an impressive label. The exterior of the case is fair only with some damage to leather and stitching opening with leather peeling back. The interior of the case is very good plus condition. An unusual set which was associated and marketed by Watson who was a well known London maker circa 1890 to the turn-of-the Century. Est.: \$7,500 - \$15,000.
- Lot 538 Late Addition- Rare and Desirable pinfire "Baby" LeMat two barrel pistol consisting of a 9-shot 8mm cal. Revolver and a .410 gauge smoothbore lower barrel with the revolver octagon upper barrel measuring 4-1/4" and the lower round barrel measuring 2-1/2", blue finish, checkered wood grips, #36. This gun is in overall good condition showing traces of original blue in protected areas; barrel marked "sys LeMat" on the left side barrel flat, "J.F. Bouery Canal & Cie a Paris" on the top flat and "Bte S.G.D.G." on the right barrel flat. The balance of the metal surfaces has gone to an even light grey patina with scattered light pin prick pitting; crisp action including the hammer selector lever, barrel, trigger and frame matching serial #s, ramrod numbered "62" but matching in condition with the rest of the gun. The bores should clean to good, the grips are good overall. The LeMat was a favorite of Confederate Officers during the Civil War. The large frame LeMat was produced in Paris, France and Birmingham, England with less than 3,000 manufactured. The "Baby" LeMat's production has been estimated at only 100 manufactured. Very seldomly offered for sale with less than a dozen known to collectors. Est.: \$20,000-\$40,000.

- Lot 539 Late Addition-Original oil on canvas showing American Indian brave with trade- type musket in full regalia signed Don Prechtel, dated 1968, approximately 20" high by 24" wide, nicely framed and matted. The artwork is in good condition. The reverse of the stretcher bar is inscribed from Don Prechtel to the buyer. Prechtel is a very well recognized artist who is famous for his Civil War and western scenes and who currently resides in the northwest. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.
- Lot 544 Late Addition- Winchester model 1892 special order rifle with factory 22" full round barrel, full mag, checkered pistol gripped stock, serial #378937. This scarce shorter than standard rifle is in .25-20 caliber and retains 75-85% original blue overall with most of the loss of finish on the frame. The stocks are very good with fairly sharp checkering and a few minor marks in the wood. The markings are sharp, action tight. A nice rifle and the only pistol gripped checkered short rifle we have seen in a long while. Est: \$1,500 - \$3,000
- Lot 571 This knife was found with a broken blade and was professionally restored by Hugh Hayes who disclosed this fact when he displayed the piece. We have just ascertained this information and want to inform perspective buyers of its excellent restoration.
- Lot 580 Late Addition-Man's 18K Gold Rolex President with concealed clasp, quick set, Sapphire Crystal, for average size man possibly 1 like removed. a large man would require links to be added. Recently cleaned and reconditioned. New Retail approx. \$19,000-22,000. Correct Rolex 18K Band. Est. \$6,000-12,000
- Lot 581 Late Addition- Colt model 1878 double-action frontier revolver in .45 long colt caliber, 7-1/2" barrel, nickel and gold plated, New York style scroll engrave with original to the period pearl grips, #2975, made about 1879. The pistol has been nicely restored and refinished with 100% of the nickel, gold, and fire blue trip retained. The engraving is Nimschke in style but has been re-cut or sharpened and we have not verified at factory. Markings good, action good. Very attractive and "showy" with great original period pearl grips and early "fat" straps. Est: \$2,000 - \$4,000
- Lot 582 Late Addition-12-shot European double-action pinfire revolver of Lefauchaux style in approx 7.5mm pinfire caliber. Approx 9-1/2" overall with 4-5/8" barrels. Blue and satin finish with raised carved wood grips. The pistol shows no markings, serial numbers, and just Belgium proofs. The pistol is of high quality and shows light floral engraving. Approx. 75-85% original blue remains on barrel and cylinder with the frame, trigger guard, hammer and straps being satin on bright metal. The pistol has a light coating of dried oil, slight surface rust (from storage that would clean) and just starting erosion and pinprick pitting most of which would clean easily. The action is tight, interior bright, grips at least very good plus and generally very good plus overall which might clean to excellent. 12-shots of this size and caliber are scarce and this piece has the "untouched" as found in the attic look that old collectors love. Est: \$1,500 - \$3,000
- Lot 583 Late Addition- Pinfire knife pistol of Belgium manufacture marked Epreuve on barrel and Brevete S.G.B.G. on blade with S.B. in cartouche on ricasso. The knife is equipped with 6-shot 5-1/2mm pinfire revolver with folding trigger and horn scales. The knife-pistol also has an ejector and loading gate on the right side. The body measures 5-1/2", the barrel measures 2-1/4", the blade is 4". The gun is in very good plus condition with slight damage to horn scales, some drifting of nickel on barrel but generally sharp and crisp with most original polish on blade. Good double-action mechanism that is tight and revolves perfectly. Only marked specimen we have cataloged. Est. \$1,500 - \$3,000
- Lot 589 Late Addition-Colt Single Action Army Revolver, .45 Colt caliber, 7 1/2" barrel, traces of nickel finish, wood grips, serial #85688, shipped to Schuyler, Hartley and Graham, New York, N.Y, Feb. 5, 1883, in shipment of 50. Factory letter confirms caliber, barrel length, stocks not listed and shipped blue, Schuyler, Hartley and Graham were known to do their own plating rather than pay colt's high prices for nickeling. The Colt remains in fair to good condition with approx. 10% plus nickel overall, some light to moderate erosion, surface pitting and cleaning. Numbers have been enhanced or retraced on trigger guard and at tops and ends. There has been some cleaning and coloring on trigger

guard and some well done minor restorations. A better than average old black powder Colt with good barrel address, patent dates, good grips, good action and slightly dark bore. Est. \$2,500-\$5,000

- Lot 590 Late Addition-Colt Single Action Army Revolver, .44 Henry rim fire caliber, 7 ½" barrel, grey patina finish, wood, grips, serial #1066 with factory letter confirming all features except grips not listed and shipped to Schuyler, Hartley and Graham New York, New York on November 3, 1877, in shipment of 50. The Colt remains in good condition showing light cleaning, polishing. Well done restorations and retouching of numbers (retraced with engraving tool where light in a couple of places) but generally better than average overall with light refreshing to grips. Patent dates on frame weak. Good barrel address, good bore, good slot in frame, good and correct hammer, increasingly hard to find and a good deal having been shipped to England where due to the unobtainable hammer they are legal. Est. \$6,000-\$12,000
- Lot 591 Late Addition- Massive European made single-action revolver marked "Hudson Bay" on barrel. In approx. 9mm rimfire. Serial #41, smooth bored. The pistol measures 14-1/2" overall with 7" barrel. The pistol features a 6-shot cylinder, octagon barrel, removable ejector rod mounted on bottom of barrel, nicely scroll engraved on frame with rolled cylinder scene similar to Colt Dragoon scene, massive checkered wood grip and smooth bored. The right side of frame is engraved Henot's patent in English. The revolver shows 80-90% European restored 19th century type blue finish, sharp original grips. Crisp overall with 100% scene, crisp action, bright bore, sharp edge, and Belgium proofs. An obvious attempt by European manufacturers to enter the North American market, possibly the fur or trapper trade, with a shot-loaded rimfire round. Interesting that the revolver cannot be sighted until the center hammer is cocked back. The only example known to this cataloger. Est.\$1,500 - \$3,000
- Lot 592 Late Addition- Remington Rider's patent .32 extra short caliber magazine repeating derringer, originally engraved with scarce blue and case-hardened finish. Rosewood grips. The derringer shows typical Nimschke style scrolls with his ropes and borders. Approx. 10-20% original blue and light case colors. Good markings. Bright blue on hammer. Original magazine. Good grips with some small nicks, mars, and normal aging. Est: \$1,500 - \$3,000
- Lot 624 Correction- gun is 410 not 28ga
- Lot 625 Possible excellent restoration
- Lot 637 Late Addition-Parker GHE-grade 12ga double-barrel shotgun, 30" barrels, double triggers, auto ejectors, serial number "236968". Made circa 1933, on 1-1/2 frame. Right barrel choked .025 modified, left barrel .037 full. The barrels show Parker special steel marking on rib, the bottom of breech marked Parker overload proved. The right barrel is marked "HT/A", "PS" in a circle with a numeral "3" and the numerals "12". The rear lug is marked "12" and "1-1/2", indicating frame size. The barrels retain approx. 90-95% original blue with some slight thinning at the edges, slight scratches, and just beginning age. The frame shows 20-40% case hardening, lightly cleaned in some areas to natural metal, some areas of minor erosion and pin prick pitting and some bright hardening where protected, particularly under the lever and on the inside of the action. The stocks are good to very good with some scratches and mars to the varnish, some slight wear to the edges of the checkering but still very sharp with just some normal ages and minor bruises from use. The original buttplate is retained, the gun is mechanically sound, the bore is still bright. Est.: \$1,500-\$3,000.
- Lot 678 Late Addition-1861 dated tower .58 caliber brass mounted musket, cut and wrapped with tacks and Indian style decorations. The gun measures 41-3/4" overall with 26" barrel. The metal surfaces show light to heavy pitting within a black to brown deep patina. The forestock is hide wrapped and sinew stitched with many large brass tacks which show patina. The buttplate is removed and butt scorched from camp fires. The end of the stitching near the muzzle shows a loop where a feather was once attached. A real Indian gun that shows frontier wear and carry and is from a local collectors estate who obtained it from James Serven in the 1950's by tradition. Est: \$1,000 - \$3,000

- Lot 709 Fascinating double sided glass framed and matted Probate appraisal document in overall good condition, dated August 25, 1848, covering the estimated probate value of the estate of Hiram D. Miller including the value of corn crops, farm hogs, horses, cattle, furnishings, tools, and 12 slaves. Est.: \$100-\$200.
- Lot 710 Lot of leather holsters and cartridge belts including an early Norvell-Shapleigh Hardware Co.-marked single loop and tooled brown leather holster for a Colt SAA revolver in very good condition with an unmarked leather belt; an unmarked tooled leather holster and unmarked leather cartridge belt that appears to be for a medium frame revolver (such as a Colt Model 1877) with nickel studs along the top of the holster, circa 1920's; two older leather belts, unmarked, one a cartridge belt with tooling and appearing to be Mexican and circa 1900-1920 in worn condition; two modern leather holsters, one a Hunter, for short barrel medium frame revolvers in overall good condition and two modern leather holster rigs, one a shoulder holster for a large frame revolver and the other a tooled holster with carved horse head on the front and a cartridge belt, possibly Mexican made, both rigs in very good condition. Est.: \$400-\$800.
- Lot 711 Lot of two powder horns, the first being approx. 12" overall with a wood base plug, lots of wear and a great look; the other is a scrimshawed old horn approx. 14" overall showing a repeating square and dot design with a date "1758" and the initials "R" or "OR" around the horn base and the initials "HR" carved into the wood plug with a vertical bar intersecting the horizontal leg of the "H" that connects to the "R". This horn is in well worn condition and is accompanied by a letter from Edward L. Kreinheder Antiques of Warrensburg, NY, dated Oct. 2, 1981 indicating that when he purchased the horn in a big collection, it was said to have been the horn of a Mohawk Indian in service with the British in the French and Indian War. An interesting story that may be researchable but sold as is. Est.: \$200-\$400.
- Lot 712 Colt Model 1908 hammerless semi-auto pistol, .380 cal., 4" barrel, blue finish, checkered Colt medallion wood grips, #34171. This gun is in overall fine condition showing approx. 99% original finish; fine bore, crisp action, sharp markings, excellent grips, correct two-tone magazine, all contained in a factory box with inner lid label, and factory instructions. Hard to improve upon this one. Est.: \$700-\$1,400.
- Lot 820 Late Addition-Oil painting on canvas of bear being braced by dogs signed R.P. Kilbert. The painting measures 21" x 18" and is in an old period frame. R.P. Kilbert is a well regarded American artist who died in 1946 and his works are sought after by collectors. He exhibited in 1900 at Chicago Academy of Art and received a gold medal and also San Francisco Art Academy 1935 where he received another gold medal. He studied at the Art Institute of Chicago and Academie Julien in Paris and Laurens in Munich. Est.: \$1,250-\$2,500.
- Lot 880 Late Addition- Springfield model 1898 Krag rifle .30-40 caliber. Serial #144794. The rifle remains in good condition with 40-60% thinning and toning blue. The stock shows a J. F. C. cartouche on right side. Stock shows many dings, mars, and ship of the type associated with the military issue and storage. There is a chip over the action at the top where wood is missing. Action good, bore good, markings good. Est. \$400 - \$800
- Lot 884 Late Addition-U.S. Springfield Model 1903 bolt action rifle, 30-06 cal., 24" round barrel, Parkerized finish, wood stock, #1340663. This rifle is in overall excellent condition showing the majority of its military finish on metal parts, excellent bore, crisp action, sharp markings, barrel dated 1-30 with "RA" and flaming bomb; stock is fine with circle P proof on underside of stock behind the trigger guard and "DAL" in rectangle on left side of stock above the trigger assembly; three sling swivels, smooth National Match metal butt plate with compartment for cleaning kit. Est.: \$500-\$1,000.
- Lot 894 Late Addition- Colt Dragoon .44 Caliber brass and iron mold showing N. W. inspection. The sprue cutter shows pitting with light Colt's patent marks. Cavities are good, legs slightly bent. Dark patina on brass. Est: \$350 - \$600
- Lot 901 Late Addition- Marlin XXX standard 1873, .32 caliber rimfire, 5-shot revolver with brass frame, serial #622. The revolver retains 30-60% original blue turning brown with slight erosion and natural aging. The frame shows traces of silver within an uncleaned brass patina. The grips are good with a few marks and scratches. Action good, interior good. Est: \$250 - \$500
